Pond Winterization Ideas

Every new season brings something different to our ponds and gardens, and changes in how we do things come with temperature changes. As winter approaches, some St. Louis Water Garden Society members consider protecting their pumps, filters, and other mechanics from the harsh winter's cold. Others are thinking about more precious assets their favorite fish. A few are already thinking about equipment, store them in a non-freezing place. next spring—and how to minimize the problems they will face when it's time to gear up again after the snow and ice have melted. It doesn't matter how many times you have been through it all. There are always things you don't remember or need to update.

Water features are as beautiful in the winter as in the summer if proper plans are made and carried out. During the most frigid weather, ice formations are spectacular and may even draw the homeowner pond-side for a closer look. Generally, one can divide winterizing your pond into five categories: Plants, Nets, Pumps, Ice, and Fish. Although each of these categories is related, closing your pond for the winter may be easier to handle when divided into tasks.

Plants: Pull out any tropicals you may have in your pond. Then, cut back any of the hardy plants necessary to make sure your net fits nicely over

your pond.

Pumps: As the water temperature dips into the low 50s, it is time to clean your pumps and make another filter choice. Do you want to leave the fall/ spitter run all winter? 2: Do you feel more comfortable taking the pump indoors for the winter? If you decide not to use some pumps or

Ice: Although St. Louis usually does not experience long periods of frigid weather, we pond owners still need to be prepared for the possibility of ice-over. An ice-over will cause your fish to die if it lasts more than three days. The buildup of toxic gases will speed up if fish overpopulate the pond. Another contributor to fish death during an ice-over is the amount of debris or sediment at the bottom. Eliminating this debris will contribute to your fish's health. Putting a pond heater or a bubbler in for the winter will help. Keep a hole in the ice for gases to escape

Fish: As the nights grow longer and the days cooler, your fish will show signs of slowing down. Once you check your pond temperature and determine that it is below 65 degrees, it is time to change to a cool-weather food like a wheat germ product.









Leave a little pump running during the winter months to keep a hole in the ice.

This member net has a lower dome but the general feeling is there. They also put a finer net a week or two later. Since there is a white pine tree close by, the finer netting helps keep most of those needles out of the pond.






